HARLESTON is a market town in the parish of Redenhall, 20 miles S. from Norwich, 30 N.E. from Bury St. Edmunds, and 100 N.E. from London, situate on a small rivulet; it consists for the most part of two streets, running nearly parallel with each other, and is remarkable for its neat and cleanly appearance. Latterly the town has been much improved, many new and genteel houses having sprung up in various parts; a new and spacious Corn Exchange has been erected-which is a handsome building—the town is well lighted with gas; and further improvements are contemplated to be carried out. It appears that Harleston was anciently called Herolveston, or Heroldston, from a Danish lord, who was particularly instrumental in quelling a formidable rebellion in the time of that unfortunate monarch Richard II. The manufacture of bombazines was at one time carried on here, but has long since entirely disappeared, and the trade of the place now chiefly consists in supplying the inhabitants and their suburban neighbours with the various commodities they require. The Duke of Norfolk,

who is lord of the manor, holds courts occasionally.

The parish Church, dedicated to St. Mary, is in the village of Redenhall, about a mile and a half from the town; this fine fabric was rebuilt (except the tower) of freestone, in 1330, by Thomas Earl of Norfolk; the tower, which is embattled, and has pinnacles at each corner, was completed in 1520, but so much injured by lightning in 1616 that it was found necessary to brace it together; it is however considered one of the handsomest in the county, and the bells it contains are much admired for their sweetness of tone; a superior organ of the value of £600. was erected in the sacred edifice in 1843. In the chantry are elegant monuments to the memory of the Kerrich and Wogan families, and in the north chapel are memorials of the Gawdy family, whose arms are emblazoned on the windows in stained glass. Harleston has a chapel of ease, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, and chapels for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyans. There are schools, both upon the British and National systems, a well supported Farmers' Club, and a Savings' Bank, which contains a large amount, deposited by the thrifty and thoughtful classes of the community. A market takes place on Wednesday, and FAIRS on July 5th and 6th, September 9th and 10th, third Wednesday in September, and October 12th. In 1841, Harleston with Redenhall contained a population of 1662.

HARLING (EAST), sometimes called Market Harling, is a small market town and parish, in the hundred of Guilteross, distant 22 miles S.W. from Norwich, 9 N.E. from Thetford, 90 N.N.E. from London, and about one mile and a quarter from a station on the Norfolk railway. The town stands upon a pleasing eminence, whose base is watered by a gentle rivulet which ultimately mingles its waters with the river Waveney; it is a neat built place, and at one period was noted for spinning yarn and fabricating linen cloths; these branches are now entirely extinct, and the prosperity of the town chiefly depends upon the benefits arising from the fertility of the soil, which hereabouts is mostly arable, and rendered by the skilful farmer very productive. In the vicinity is Flint Hall, the residence of Mr. E. Bale, an enterprising agriculturist and feeder of cattle, who has recently erected a steaming apparatus
